Departure from Bad Homburg

Friday, from 12:30 p.m. around sixty crews will start the Rally from the German city of Bad Homburg, third on list. The Belgian José Lareppe, triple winner of this notorious event, will be the first to launch behind the wheel of his Opel Kadett GT/E.

Its Thermal Baths, covering almost 45 hectares (111 acres), and its casino made Bad Homburg one of the European's gambling capitals.





Departure from Barcelona

Around a hundred crews have chosen the Catalan capital as city of departure. At 6 p.m., the 2013 World Champion in WRC-3, Sébastien Chardonnet will be the first to enter the race from the Avenida de la Catedral towards the Principality of Monaco.

Located on the Mediterranean coast, Spain's second city is known, among other things, for its Ramblas and the Sagrada Familia, the famous basilica designed by the architect Antonio Gaudi that remains the most visited monument of Spain





Departure from Reims

Great classic of the Concentration Routes in France, Reims generally regroups the greater number of crews for departure (almost 130 this year). Many notorious names will start the rally starting at 7 p.m. from the podium located near the City Hall: Jean Ragnotti, Michel Leclere, Alain Serpaggi, Carlos Antunes-Tavares, the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the PSA Peugeot Citroën group, present for the third time, and let's not forget about the nine-time World Champion, the monégasque Daniel Elena, with Olivier Campana by his side.

Sub-prefecture of Marne, Reims is notorious for its champagne, which is both its principal historical asset and one of the strength of its economy.
